OLLI's Annual Fund Campaign is again underway. So if you...

This year's campaign, which began in October and ends January 15, has a goal of \$20,000. Every cent goes to expand and enhance the total OLLI experience of lifelong learning and personal growth.

"Membership and class fees, and the endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation, cover about 90 percent of our basic operating expenses," explains OLLI Executive Director Tim Meehan. "We depend on the Annual Fund to help provide those services and activities that make OLLI so special for our members."

Last year's Annual Fund helped OLLI offer Saturday and evening classes and launch the Gwinnett OLLI program. This year's Fund will help sustain the popular summer Dartmouth and Cine movie programs and perhaps upgrade audio-visual equipment, among other uses.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We are an Organization and a Community, but we are also individuals on our own lifelong learning journey. The advantage of having 150 + classes per semester, a variety of SIGS, and engaging travel means that there is probably no other member who has the same experience as you. I like the comparison to running — both a team sport, a community sport, but also an individual pursuit. Sometimes the route is easy, and sometimes we go through a hard mile, where everything is a struggle.

One of the motivational phrases on a recent run I did was "trying your best, may not be your personal best, but it is the best you can do today." We know that money can be tight, and \$20,000 for our Annual Fund Campaign seems like a daunting target. However, this translates to \$17.50 per member. If you have not given to the campaign before, please think about donating whatever you can — working together we can make our target for the year.

Running is also about little and often. You cannot expect to run a marathon without putting in the miles beforehand, a little bit every day, every week, every month. For OLLI, a monthly recurring donation for the

campaign, little and often, rather than a one-off larger donation, can help both you and OLLI budget better. Ten dollars a month might well be easier than \$100 at one time.

We continue to reach out to the communities around UGA Gwinnett, while raising our profile at festivals and civic events. This is where your contributions make the difference.

A final thank you to our members who gave to the Annual Fund last fiscal year. We exceeded our goal for last year, and I believe, if we all chip in a little, we can beat the goal again this year, and in doing so we can support each other on the hard miles of our lifelong learning journey.













THE TOOLS OF ENGAGEMENT: OLLI COMM EVENTS

One of the most powerful tools in the OLLI COMM toolbox announces and lets people RSVP to SIG and committee meetings and activities. The **Events** feature makes it easy for group leaders to announce the date, time, place, and details of upcoming meetings and activities, and for members to RSVP.

You can view an Event for your group by:

- Clicking on **RSVP Now** in the email notification of the Event, which takes you directly to the Event itself, or
- Visiting OLLI COMM at olli-uga.mn.co or in the Mighty Networks app. Click the name of your SIG or committee, click the Events tab near the top of the page, then click to select and open the Event you'd like to view.

The image below is an example of what members of the Picture This! SIG would have viewed upon opening an Event posted by SIG leader Gary Whiting for their November meeting. Here, members were able to:

- Click to see a Google map and get directions to the Event location.
- Click to add the Event to their Google, Apple, or Outlook calendar.
- Click to RSVP (Going, Not Going, or Maybe) to the Event to share their plans with their group leader. This is especially critical for Events taking place at restaurants or other venues where seating/ space or admission may be limited. If their plans change, members can always update their RSVP selection so group leaders can make any necessary adjustments.

The next time your SIG leader or committee chair posts an Event, be sure to check out this user-friendly feature!


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volunteers in the community in various capacities. Most importantly, she never stops educating herself and her daughter outside the classroom!

OLLI has more than 1,100 members so reaching \$20,000 shouldn't be hard. A gift of \$200 from 100 members—or just \$50 from 400 members—would do it. A donor of \$150 will be recognized as a class sponsor.

OLLI President Carol Coman has been an Annual Fund donor since becoming a member in 2017. She says her gift is a way to support volunteers, who are crucial to OLLI's work. "I had no idea how dependent OLLI is on volunteers but that soon became abundantly clear," she says. "I began making donations to applaud the work of our volunteers and to help subsidize events and projects important to our growth and expansion."

Annual Fund donations go directly to OLLI and aren't shared with any other University of Georgia entity. Donors can make a one-time direct gift, pledge periodic payments throughout the year, or arrange for smaller recurring monthly payments through the UGA giving platform. Donations can be for general use or restricted for a specific purpose and are tax deductible.

Live Oak Caregivers is a new OLLI sponsor. Its purpose is to provide licensed caregiving services in-home that support the essential activities of everyday

life. Locally, Live Oak serves Athens, Madison, Gainesville, Braselton, Monroe, Winder, Commerce, Lake Oconee, and surrounding areas, with offices also in Atlanta and Chattanooga. It is not a franchise. Since 2014 the family-run organization has delivered more than two million hours of service to more than 1,000 clients.

Live Oak's mission is clear: To enlist caregivers who are dedicated to delivering top-notch care with compassion to all clients and their families in the comfort of their homes. Each of the more than 350 Certified Nursing and Personal Care Assistants is carefully selected, highly qualified, and trained. A case manager is assigned to each client to track caregiver performance. Customized client care plans and caregiver responsibilities are developed and supervised by a registered nurse.

Among the in-home services offered by Live Oak are bathing and dressing; hygiene and grooming; toileting and continence; socializing and companionship; light housekeeping and laundry; mobility, ambulation and transfers; medication reminders and set up; shopping and errands; meal preparation and feeding; and transportation to appointments. Other needs can be tailored to the client.

Non-medical tasks can be adapted to include shopping, gift wrapping and shipping; creating floral arrangements; technology assistance; planning travel; organizing and moving/storing personal items; escorting clients to the theatre, events and church; and keeping family updated on their loved one.

Live Oak takes pride in upholding diligent standards to guarantee the highest quality of care. This is accomplished by surpassing state requirements with in-depth background checks and requiring CPR, First

Aid, and AED certification as well as TB testing for each member of the caregiving workforce.

Feedback is gathered continuously through client surveys and on-site monitoring to maintain continuous evaluation and to identify areas for improvement.


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
